Dec. 23rd Saturday Eve dock 37. In how before returning out
to Berlin, rain pouring down from heaven. What has
excited me lately was the notice from Rösch that
the minister thinks of appointing Kasse. I am gladdened
several days by it. Health in general good, sleep well, the
eye not so much affected since I discontinued washing
with cold water, but extremely weak so that walking
in moderate wind hurts it considerably with the fog!
which he said to attack me & by the small very small
number of enquirers, it has never been smaller indeed, & some
of them like Hüser etc. only reaching in the way of photography.
Baumgarten ^{Budach, Almon} has arrived but dreary fellow.
Toppels is dear to my mind, he satisfies my desire
completely.

2 Jan. 38. Returned from Berlin with sad account from the
minister, which grieved me, for as to Lücke I cannot entertain
any hope. My eyesight very weak so that using the left eye
occasions instantly pains. Read in the chronicle observes
of the splitting of the christians without end. Cannot read &
for doing any thing else I have no opportunity & ability
Informed of poor Wagner's death. Strongest desire to give up
my place as Prof. for being obliged to work & not

being able pains me. However lest The ungrateful
I cannot but repeat what God has given me.
He afforded me much pleasure again in Berlin.
Even walking on the large streets & passing the
gaudy uniforms & splendid shops is a recreation
for one who is so apt to be absorbed in himself.
Last evening at Louise felt uncomfortable because
the room seemed very cold & f. formal. Went to
H. on foot though very wet & was retained with
him a while. Next morning to Kottw. & from him
to Strauss, then to Hengst. to dinner, where also the
Gehrmers' relation of Prince August's journey
to the Sultan, who appeared after dinner with the
children. Some sleep, then to Görschel most kind but
unclear about Strauss, evening again with company
at H's with General Quandt & Bohr. Next morning
ten to Jünger ~~without~~, made me glad but - do
see any thing? - Saturday noon dined at Lanow's with
Antony, Heffrich, Lana, Gulachs, Lefft, Eichmann, Anders. Oh
how sweet & interesting. Major Get. spoke of Goerz
Mystic, speaking of all Omucles in some way
of course.

Jan. 17th. 1838 Wednesd evening 5 o'clock. Dreadfull cold
24 degrees. Deeply affected on account of the scantiness
of enquirers. The Tuesday evenings never so scanty before:
Schwen, Henske, Wiese, Hartlag II, P. Hoff, Angen, Krickner,
Eckardt, Reinhard & two more. In the lecture today some few
folks here & there dispersed, & John 45 from 110 come.
The sermon last Sunday scantily attended. There must be
acknowledged some influence of the cold, but that does not
explain all. The only new enquirer I may mention is Schmidt
& he is more a follower of Erdmann. When I came lately from
Greiner & had talked with him about Lücke & Baumgarten
all seemed bright to me, & now B. has met with a refusal &
as to L. I am without prospect. I cannot however forbear
mentioning the joy that Müller is released, provided it be not
again a lie. — I am now 39 years, soon 40, therefore support
K's d's, support. I felt in my heart quite ready to submit
to all dealings of the Lord & a great confidence to his
goodness.

Jan. 31 1838 Thursday 38. Last night informed that Baum met with a
repulse & Böhm VII, the arbitrariness & partiality of Geo. vexed
me most pungently, Baumg. departed, read the review of my Hebrew in
Rheinm., found in it the impressions Schultz had left upon the work,
most deeply grieved at the injustice of the world. A most painful
thing to find himself misunderstood & reproved by
the whole world. But when he had received the letter of Müller
in which he informs me of his final enlargement: Oh says
he what a feeling after 3 years to be quite free! How deeply
I feel it with him, yes a burden is taken from my heart
since this took place, but oh that I might see my yearning
of the heart fulfilled & could see him placed at my side

in my convenient situation!

3 Feb. Saturday evening, after having taken a walk with Davies & lectured on Encyclopaedia. At 11 heard from Thilo that Hase will come: well I dare not be sorry beforehand, for it can happen as with Billroth, only I must apprehend that now Niem's denunciation is certain. At 11 a walk with Edman who was most kind & friendly, I felt love for him & must confide in him without let or hindrance. Asked him about Schauen: Conradi says, Damen can not be the last for there is always a Gegensatz gegenüber dem da, daher ein bezauberndes Schauen wie Gott, Edm: die Momente des Glanzens in des Dements - du die höchsten sind als ewig.
