April 27 Journal. 12 May 1830 I turn this leaf over & again searching for the wide space between the last day & this. And as usual I may say it is a comparatively tolerable space that lies between both. First the journey to Lpz., though there is wanting in it the breath of friendships & youthfulness & consequently somewhat dull. On Oct. 12 I called fr. Berlin, I was missing civility & therefore forgiving moderate. At that very period the disclosure & with it hours of deep intercourse with God. The winter sem. one of the most cheerful. Immediately after the return from the journey about 4 weeks greater suffering from bad sleep & already the apprehension of its becoming lasting. But it passed over & I was able to set at work at the Hebrews most industriously every morn at 5. Full lecture with attentive hearers in Latin Jan²³, ab 60 in Gr. also read with animation & interest with only fr. Nassau, Erdmann fr. Westph., Sayfr fr. Magb., Haack Hambr. Held fr. Lpz., Sch. fr. Altona. That he has escaped me grieves me most sorely, for poor whom I took instead of him to get too lifeless & fancyless. Oh that those who belong together find themselves so rarely & when they have met, must part! - Vacation stayed here in order to work Hebrews, but engaged to go to Lpz. - It out at noon with v. Schwarz from Brenckendorf, happily reached N. Gz., down in front mainly to his quarters, ev. at the left side of the tea table, quite subordinate - Oh that mild & humble creature, how I should have ruined up in rebellion against such defect degradation and sly slow creeping. At noon off with Zahne, he always talkative but always modestly & moderately so that when after a talk at Kroth on Retardation etc he again remained in his quiet mood I began to moan within at the want of a completely even tempered instrument. Then I expressed in a letter written fr. Lpz. (in comp. of Todt) the Bk of Job & told today, no answer, the most eager anxiety for the reason of it which seems totally unreasonable.

 the impression of a mind that believes without nerve without a mark of interroga-
 tion! But that good man Adam Riley has he ever gone through the process of reflexion?
 Can any one who has gone through it give it totally discard the recollection of all
 that may be said against it? Nay not even Heindel & Heubner can do so. There seems
